Meeting was called to order at 14h14 local.

1 WELCOME FROM PRESIDENT

1.1 WELCOME BY ISCARSAH PRESIDENT PAULO LOURENÇO

President Paulo Lourenço welcomed everyone and expressed his enthusiasm about the meeting participation and activity of the committee, giving a brief overview of the discussion items.

1.2 WELCOME BY PRESIDENT OF ICOMOS ADCom KERIME DANIS

Kerime Danis acknowledged the ancestors of the land she was calling from. She congratulates Iscarsah on the activities and notes that the greater ICOMOS has been impressed by the process.

2 MEMBERSHIP & OPERATIONS

2.1 MEMBERSHIP

Information prepared for presentation by Mehrdad Hejazi, with pre-recorded video

Presented by Tom Morrison due to technical challenges. A reminder that Iscarsah has three levels of membership, Expert Member, Associate Member, and Non-ICOMOS Member. These continue to adjust and be adjusted to match our evolving needs.

When applying for membership there is the following process:

1. Interested person is to contact Iscarsah at iscarsah@gmail.com to request the current application form. Anyone who applies is to use the current form.
2. Candidate is to E-mail the completed form, a CV, and two references to iscarsah@gmail.com
3. The submitted package is reviewed by Iscarsah Bureau, and a decision is provided within a couple of months.

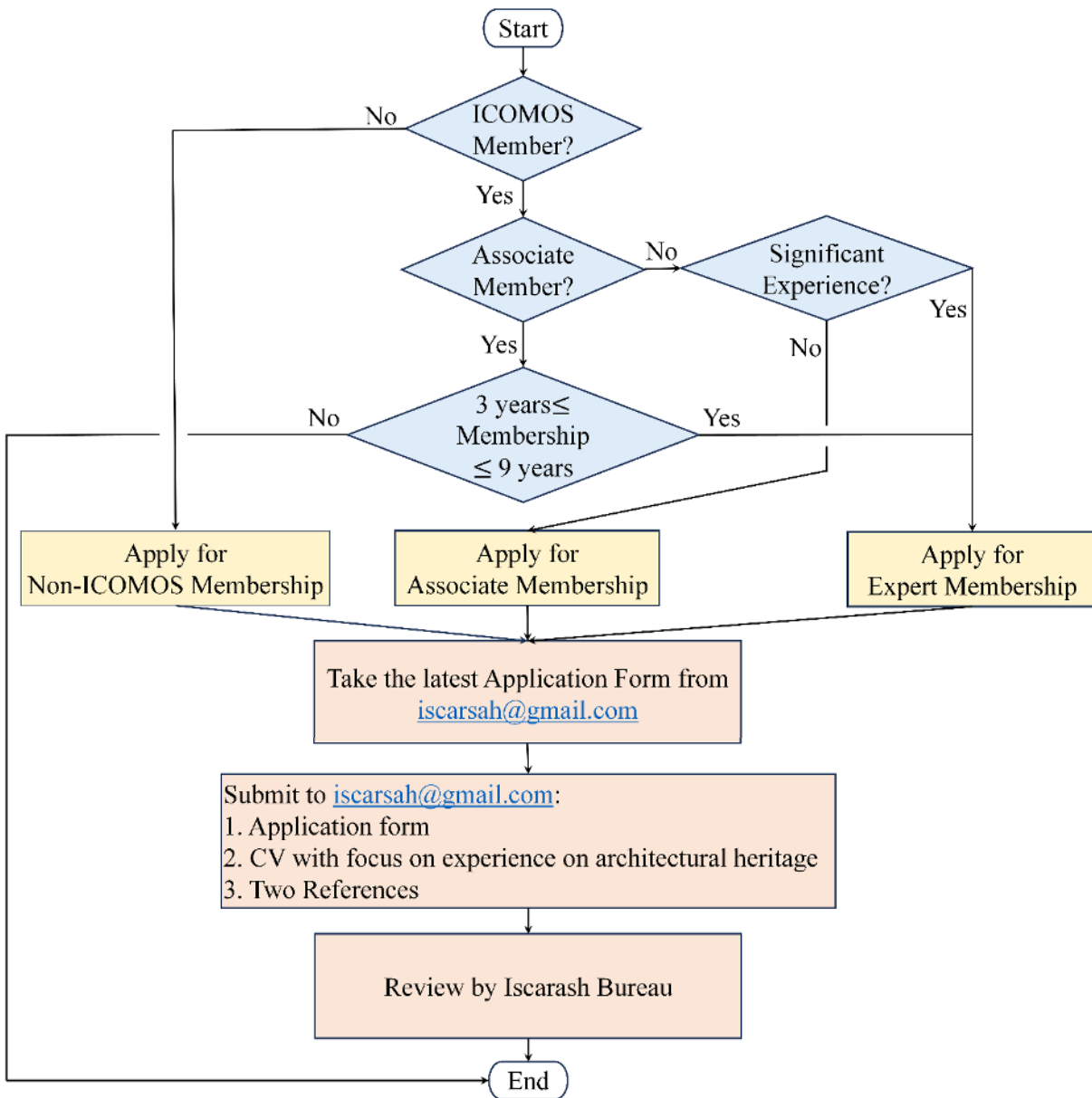


Figure 1: Flow chart on membership process.

4. Mehrdad provided a flow chart for reference, which is provided in Figure 1.

There has been a large amount of interest new membership. From Sept. 2024 and Sept. 2025 there have been 33 new members. Fourteen Experts, 13 Associates and 6 Non-ICOMOS.

Distribution found that Italy and Polish members have seen the greatest increases in the last year.

Stephen Kelley and Mehrdad Hejazi have been carrying the work to process so many applications and keep the process organized.

2.2 OPERATIONS UPDATES

Presented by Tom Morrison.

Membership review is ongoing. We understand that life does not always allow involvement, but we do anticipate people to be active. Anyone that has not received listserv messages needs to let Tom Morrison know. There should have been messages received in the week before the meeting.

Tom reached out to many of our members looking at adjusting memberships – thank you for the help for everyone that contacted me. If you haven't contacted me, please do so. Secretariat E-mail is secretariat@iscarsah.org or you can contact me directly at tmorrison@heritagestanding.ca.

Iscarsah is currently aligning membership details with ICOMOS. This has been slow to start but should be happening more over the next month and a half.

In terms of communications, Iscarsah has gone from having two listserv's to one. This is in response to policy changes with the gaggle.email domain. Communication remains one of the significant challenges we are working on.

Our Vice President Radu Cazamir has been working on the website, and has an Iscarsah members area partly prepared on the website. We are hoping to launch this site in the coming months. You can register, and you will be able to fill in your profile. We are still determining how to best setup the service. Generally, it will allow users to:

- Register and complete personal profiles
- Become part of a shared database visible to other members
- Allows communication between members.
- Helps match members with potential opportunities.

3 OVERVIEW OF ISCARSAH ACTIVITIES

Presented by Paulo Lourenço.

The full Bureau was re-introduced. The Bureau has both general and geographic diversity. This is nearing the end of its term.

Currently Iscarsah has over 200 members; 8 of which were accepted last week. Not all of these are active, we have about 100 active members, and over this year we are organizing our lists to determine who remains active or wishing to be active. Our membership is composed of multiple levels, with a range of members from a range of countries.

We have been much active this year. As the AGM, we have technical tours, meetings, and involvement with the associated SAHC conference. We have 70 members here today and are thankful to all of you that are attending in person or online. We also thank Savvas Saloustros for all he has done to help this meeting happen.

Our social media presence has increased. We continue to make regular updates on Facebook and LinkedIn, and our YouTube channel has seen the number of views triple. While three thousand views may not be much, the increase from one to three thousand is significant and a show of our momentum.

Iscarsah has continued to see a growing community.

The Iscarsah Guidelines has seen the Second Edition that was approved by Iscarsah posted online. We are now working with ICOMOS to see if this document may be approved as an official ICOMOS document, which will help it make an even bigger impact.

The Bulletin is being published twice a year, involving also non-Iscarsah members. We aim to encourage discussion and thank Meltem Vatan for her leadership.

The Webinars continue to be well received. A recent collaborative event with APT left them impressed with how many people were interested and the level of technical discussion. The Armed Conflict webinar was also impactful. These webinars are a key connection and way to fill our mandate.

Working groups have become one of the main ways for members to get involved and contribute through Iscarsah. These working groups are intended to be focused on a specific task, that a group of professionals can work on and complete. The work groups are not intended to be standing committees, but instead for one or two Bureau terms. We have approximately 50% of our committee members involved with the 4 active working groups. Some of the current groups are finishing their tasks, and we expect to have new working groups. Everyone is encouraged to start thinking about the potential.

Other activities include:

- We have new connections with the Advisory Committee of ICOMOS
- We have had productive meetings with National Committees. This is a bottom-up process, to be led nationally, but allows us to connect more with our younger members, and members in a different way not possible for an international committee
- We endorsed two conferences this year. If members have events that they believe we should endorse, please approach the Bureau to connect. We believe it is good for everyone when we can do this.
- We have created two awards to recognize our own members. As we grow it becomes more important that we recognize so many people involved. They may be given every year, should relevant activity be recognized (these are not career awards):
 - The Founder's Award is for senior professionals who make significant concrete deliverables in the past year.
 - The New Day for Conservation Award is for earlier career professionals who are making a difference in the committee's activity.
- We are looking at a potential name change, also in response to what we've heard from our survey. A specific point for discussion was included in the agenda.

Questions were raised regarding requirements for national scientific committees (NSCs). Paulo clarified that some national scientific committees are developed intentionally by their connected national ICOMOS committee, while others are created by a group of experts. In either case, if the committee wishes to connect formally with Iscarsah, we have a set of guidelines to aid in this (available in the webpage). If the NSC wishes to use our logo, we should have a formal connection. This guide was produced early in this Bureau's term.

Questions were raised about who would be in the national committee. Paulo clarified that the National committee is either defined by the National ICOMOS Committee or created in a bottom-up process from our members, following the guide we provided. Iscarsah is not intending to dictate membership, an important issue being that you have enough members to be sustainable.

Continuing to present planned activities. Paulo identified the following items for the upcoming period:

- Revisions of by-laws. This includes updating membership categories, looking at Bureau size and composition and considering the best ways to keep engagement high.
- Launching and refining the protected areas for members on the website.
- Completing the membership review.
- Completing publication of the Iran Mission 2018 Case Studies
- The election of a new Bureau, as we are part way into the final year of the current Bureau
- Planning the upcoming 2026 AGM (location TBD). We've already heard some possibilities for 2027 and 2028.

We would like to see more involvement of Iscarsah in ICOMOS AGA's, and we are looking at how to align that more effectively.

One member made the committee aware that they have a case study they would like to see included in the Iran Mission 2018 Case Study set. That is great news. As the publication schedule is moving quickly into the final stages, the article needs to be submitted quickly if we can get it into the set as everything is more or less finished.

4 ISCARSAH COMMITTEE NAME

Presented by Paulo Lourenço.

Early 2025 a suggestion was brought to the Bureau that we change the name.¹ The existing formal title for Iscarsah, *the International Scientific Committee on the Analysis and Restoration of Structures of*

¹ In response to inquires in meeting and follow up review of minutes regarding who raised the item in the Bureau, the Bureau meeting minutes does not identify who raised discussion as the current Secretary General does not record who raises a discussion item, simply confirming there is adequate support for discussion to count as it being seconded.

Architectural Heritage, was seen as too long, dissimilar from most other committees, and confusing. Before any further action was taken Paulo contacted ICOMOS to see if any discussion was merited. ICOMOS responded positive, confirmed that shorter / focused names are preferably, and encouraged that Iscarsah to investigate options.

Through March, April and May the Bureau have had internal discussions about if and how this conversation could best progress. With the growth of the committee and number of engaged members the interest was in how to help frame the discussion so that it did not detract from our current activities. The feeling was that the Bureau should provide some initial thoughts to start conversation and see how the greater committee felt.

During the internal process the Bureau thought we would suggest:

1. That the committee look at changing our name.
2. That despite the name change, we should continue to use Iscarsah as the acronym. Iscarsah remains a recognized brand. This was recognized as being a bit awkward but was also seen to be like what is currently happening where people reference Iscarsah but often struggle to say the full name of the organization.
3. That the Bureau was unsure if Iscarsah should be written ISCARSAH or Iscarsah.
4. The Bureau decided to suggest Heritage Structures and Historic Structures as potential names to start discussion.

In June the inquiry went out to all Members to gauge interest and thoughts so that the Bureau could further refine discussion. Results were:

- Total of 87 members voted
- 80 % of respondents were in favor of changing the name
- 80 % of respondents were in favor of keeping the acronym
- Two thirds of respondents were in favor of changing the name to Heritage Structures
- 54 % of respondents were in favor of using the non-capitalized Iscarsah instead of the fully capitalized ISCARSAH.

The Bureau had not anticipated such strong support with such little discussion. After asking for opinions and receiving overwhelming support for the change the Bureau felt membership wanted faster action. Based upon the responses from the survey, it was decided to bring it forward to membership for a vote at this AGM.

In this AGM the intent is to confirm the direction. This should not be a decision by the Bureau, but it should come from the committee. Gathering that feedback, the Bureau are proposing that the to vote on how we show our acronym and if we are going to go forward to ICOMOS with a request to change

out committee name. A summary of discussion and feedback received regarding advantage and disadvantages of the acronym and name were provided.

Entering discussion some members were concerned that a change in names was occurring without sufficient time for in person discussion, and consideration of the original discussions regarding the naming of our committee the *International Scientific Committee for the Analysis and Restoration of Structures of Architectural Heritage*. Some of our members would like to make know that they believe the name is appropriate and should not be changed.

Some time for discussion was allowed to look at concerns. There appeared to be some different understandings for how the term's structure would be used to represent the names, and that Heritage Structures may not capture the relation to structural conservation. There is a concern of the lost of the term analysis – and that the term analysis is key to identifying the scientific approach. Time constraints required that the item have some conclusion and decision. It was decided that there was insufficient time to discuss names now, we needed to have the name suggestions and concerns raised earlier not in this meeting.

Clarification that the full title would be the International Scientific Committee on Heritage Structures.

One member stated that the other ISC's names cover topical area, not process.²

The President requests to move forward with the agenda, given the results of the survey and the lack of negative feedback received in the past process. Still, the President called a vote from members present on if we go forward to have a vote on the name change. Vote call: would you like to go ahead to have a vote on changing the name?

First vote was regarding if we are going to vote on the name. For: 43 in person, 10 online. Those in favor of not putting it to a vote: 21.

Putting the question to a vote. Do you vote to change the name of the committee to Heritage Structures. Those in favor: 43 in person, 10 online. Those against the name Heritage Structures: 20.

The remaining decision as per the agenda is the decision regarding if the full name should be capitalized or not; Iscarsah or ISCARSAH.

A question was raised regarding who may vote. The President clarified that as he felt this impacted all our membership and not a by-law change, he is opening the vote to expert and associate members (not guests).³

² Revision 0 of the minutes included the statement that “A formal request was made that in future the Bureau provide more extensive background regarding why a change was requested, some members felt this was missing. Secretary General recognized that he would give more future consideration to how the Bureau communicates to the Committee.” This was identified by members as having been a discussion following the AGM and its removal was requested. Review of video agreed.

³ Post AGM clarification. Based upon the current By-laws, Section 5, item 8: “[...] Associate Members may be invited to vote on issues and decisions exclusive of elections and changes to the Bylaws at the discretion of the President”.

The vote on capitalization. Those for ISCARSAH: 20 + 5 (in person and online). Those for Iscarsah: 33 + 3 (in person and online).

Our recommendation to ICOMOS is that the ISC changes name to Heritage Structures (ISC Heritage Structures) and uses the acronym Iscarsah.

5 OTHER ISCARSAH ACTIVITIES

5.1 WEBINARS PLANNED

Presented by Nicoletta Bianchini and Evan Spear.

The webinar planning group is made up of Tim Michiels, Stephen Kelley, Nicoletta Bianchini and Evan Spear. Evan and Nicoletta will be around the conference, and anyone is encouraged to reach out to the working group members.

Some of the recent webinars include perspectives on the 2023 Turkey-Syria Earthquake, Perspectives on Fire Protection of Heritage Structures, Structural Interventions in Heritage: Case Studies Through the Lens of the ISCARSAH Principles (with APT) and Heritage in Time of Armed Conflict.

Looking at future topics, the group wants to look at “An insight into Iscarsah: Current Initiatives” (working title) that will look at the current working groups. Beyond that the idea is to work on technical topics like Metals embedded in Masonry and Corrosion Risk or Structural Repairs to Wood – a Joint Webinar with the ICOMOS Wood Committee.

The webinar group would like to hear from our committee members with any suggestions or ideas.

Some numbers:

- An average of 150 participants per webinar (live version)
- Approximately 15 speakers invited per year.
- A diverse pool of speakers, from academic and industry
- Events have interactions, discussion and Q & A.

5.2 ISCARSAH BULLETIN

Prepared by Meltem Vatan, read by Tom Morrison.

The Bulletin is currently being produced twice a year. The idea is to create discussion with short articles and ideas. Meltem organizes the information, typically one-to-two-page short articles to provide an overview of thoughts.

Everyone is encouraged to contribute content and create discussion. And generally, get people thinking about the interesting problems we get in each of our areas of practice.

5.3 ISCARSAH NATIONAL SCIENTIFIC COMMITTEES

5.3.1 ISCARSAH TÜRKİYE

Technical problems caused a loss of audio from Murat Alaboz, current president of Iscarsah Türkiye.

On his behalf, Tom Morrison reviewed his slides.

Iscarsah Türkiye has been an active committee doing numerous in person events to look at lessons from the City of Antioch, and presentations on earthquakes. The national committee has continued to grow and has had members active in the ISC's working Groups, particularly Building Codes and Iscarsah Principles and the Masonry Working Group.

Iscarsah Türkiye is currently planning a seminar program for the fall and spring with contributions from both local and national members.

5.3.2 ISCARSAH INDIA

Presented by Arun Menon

ICOMOS India has twenty-one scientific committees, of which the ARSAH National Scientific Committee (NSC-ARSAH) is one of the seventeen active committees.

The NSC's were asked to look at the purpose of the various ISC's and to determine if a NSC could bring value in India. Each NSC created a white paper to outline the objectives for NSC inside the National Committee. NSC-ARSAH created this.

Currently there are eighteen members of NSC-ARSAH, with a variety of professional levels and regions represented.

The NSC-ARSAH represents a key part of ICOMOS India's strategic plans. NSC-ARSAH has been part of the NSC Research projects fostering greater collaboration between groups. NSC-ARSAH has been doing a yearly scientific symposium. The group was successful in creating written agreements. The group is also undertaking regular seminars, including webinars.

The group has been fortunate to have good student involvement. This has been helped using institutional membership as an aid.

5.4 WORKING GROUPS

5.4.1 CATALOGUING MASONRY ISSUES

Presented by Filippo Casarin.

The Masonry Issues working group was motivated to how despite existing masonry being all over the world, most locations have codes and directives that do not allow proper consideration of the characteristics.

The group currently has 46 members, with good distribution around the globe. The working group is in the second year. The first year featured extensive meetings, while the second year allowed for greater development in smaller groups. It has been possible to have in person meetings to help progress the objectives.

The aim is to create two deliverables. Deliverable 1 is a critical review on available codes and procedures for classification and mechanical characterization of existing masonry types. Deliverable 2 is a Methodology for masonry laboratory and onsite testing for deriving reliable mechanical features.

Many sub-groups exist looking at different aspects. Greece presented some excellent data on processes, as did Croatia. Further info from Switzerland and Spain, Italy and Sri Lanka. Many countries are developing more guidelines and codes to help in management of management, and Turkey, Portugal, Israel and India have all provided insights and updates showing what they are investigating. All of this is being used to create the greater deliverables and intended future publications.

Deliverable 1 has been started, with the first two of five sections already complete; the remaining 3 being in progress.

The hope is to finish the first deliverable later this year, and next year move into Deliverable 2 aiming to complete it that year.

5.4.2 CLIMATE CHANGE AND ADAPTIVE REUSE

Presented by Tiago Miguel Ferreira.

The climate change and climate adaptation working group has been progressing towards completion of their project. Two years ago, the group started work on understanding the issues, building a white paper, and submitting the white paper for publication.

The group was successful in submitting the article for publication in January 2025. The group has received feedback and is currently working on revisions.

The core challenges the group tried to address is the balancing act required of how to adapt structures to be safe and resilient while preserving authenticity while trying to be sustainable while making minimal impact. The challenge is further complicated by the wide range of climate change hazards being faced by different buildings in different regions of the world.

Planning a response of the building included a look at three types of actions, abstention, circumvention, direct intervention, and relocation. These were seen to help navigate the complex issues. The proposed solution was to create a decision supported framework for making these decisions.

The decision must consider categories like conservation, resilience, sustainability, feasibility, and socio-cultural impacts. Each of these has multiple steps linked to the decisions, as is outlined and described in the paper. Users can create a tradeoff chart to aid in the decision-making process.

The process is intended to facilitate an expert discussion and is not intended to be a rigid calculation. It needs experts and an interdisciplinary team.

Key conclusions:

- There is no one size fits all solution for climate adaptation
- Using a structured multi-criteria framework enables transparent, holistic, and defensible decisions
- The process must involve interdisciplinary collaboration and stakeholder dialogue
- The goal is to find a responsible balance between preserving the past and protecting the future

The path forward will include numerous future priorities in both research and practice. This includes touching on adaptability, collaboration, innovation, policy, and engagement. The Working Group is planning to work on a webinar to help progress their topic.

5.4.3 BUILDING CODES AND ISCARSAH PRINCIPLES

Presented by Mustafa Humo.

The Building Codes and Iscarsah Principles working group has been progressing steadily over the past several years. In the intended four phase plan, Phases 1 to 3 are complete. Phase 1 looked at preparing the survey. Phase 2 was the online survey. Phase 3 looked at preparing the report templates and analysis of the regulatory documentation. Phase 4, currently in progress, look at finishing the reports and developing the global conclusions and recommendations.

This data driven process has taken the questions beyond the Working Group to get feedback and insight. The large group has worked to understand each regulatory documents and process information for the overall reports. Understanding what is regulatory, what is mandatory, and how to create comparisons between the various documents has been a challenging process.

The Working Group is aiming to complete their deliverables in the coming year.

5.4.4 ISCARSAH EXAMPLES: LESSONS LEARNED FROM PROJECTS OF ISCARSAH MEMBERS

Kei Weise had to leave the meeting for an urgent meeting regarding the AGA in Nepal this October.

5.4.5 FINAL NOTE

As a final note Paulo stresses the value that comes from the Working Groups, encouraging members to get involved and to propose their own new topics.

6 RECOGNITION

To match growth and increased involvement in Iscarsah, the Bureau has created two new awards. Namely the New Day for Conservation Award, and The Founders Award. Both awards may not be given every year.

The New Day for Conservation Award was created to recognize an early career professional who had taking on greater involvement in Iscarsah making a noteworthy impact on our activities during the past year. For the inaugural award the Bureau would like to recognize Nicoletta Bianchini for her contributions to Iscarsah, primarily through her enthusiastic involvement in 2024 Webinars.

The Founder's Award was created to recognize major contributions to real deliverables in the past year. In this inaugural year however, there was no question that it was merited. The 2024 Iscarsah Professional Award is presented to Pere Roca for steering the complex multi-year process resulting in the update of the Iscarsah Guidelines.

7 NEW BUSINESS

No new business raised.
